Comprehensive Addiction Recovery Act Requirement

The Comprehensive Addiction Recovery Act (CARA) establishes requirements to meet the needs of substance exposed and substance affected infants and their families with the development of a Plan of Safe Care for infants born and identified as being affected by substance abuse (legal or illegal), withdrawal symptoms or a Fetal Alcohol Spectrum (FAS) Disorder.

What is a plan of safe care?

Plans of safe care describe the services and supports needed to comprehensively address the needs of infants prenatally exposed to substance and their families. These federally required plans must identify family members'/caregiver's health care needs, including substance use disorder treatment services; developmental interventions for the baby; as well as services and supports needed to promote family stability. Plans of safe care incorporate all treatment plans developed by the multidisciplinary professionals serving the family. The plan of safe care is developed with the parents and all service providers. These plans may or may not require involvement of child welfare agencies.

Steps We Need to Take Together

 Provide pregnant women access to comprehensive medication assisted treatment.

• Establish guidelines and standards for treatment which includes preparing mothers for the birth of their infant who may experience withdrawal syndrome and potential involvement with Child Protective Services (CPS).

• Beginning the development of a plan of safe care prior to the birth event.

 Timely information sharing and monitoring of infants and families across multiple systems.

Consistent hospital notifications to CPS.

• Develop a set of questions and responses that will help CPS hotline workers determine if a case should be opened in order to assess the risk and protective factors and safety concerns for the infant and mother.

• Provide comprehensive assessments of the infant's physical health and the mother's parenting capacity, physical, social and emotional health.

• Develop a thorough discharge plan that provides a multi-disciplinary plan of safe care.

What does this mean for Mandated Reporters?

Mandated Reporters are required to make a referral to a Public Children Services Agency (PCSA) when an infant is identified as exposed or affected by substance use, which places the infant at risk of serious harm.

Important to note: CARA has included both legal and illegal substance abuse; meaning if an infant is exposed and/or affected by a substance which is legal (alcohol, prescribed medications, antidepressants, etc.) these infants are at risk just as an infant who is impacted by the abuse of illegal substances. Infants can and do withdrawal from prescribed legal medications and per rule if these infants are experiencing withdrawal symptoms, have a positive toxicology result or are identified as having Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, mandated reporters are expected to make a referral to their local PCSA. The PCSA must then, based on the information provided by the referent, decide whether to open a case for investigation.

With CARA in place it is the hope that when these referrals are made the additional information regarding the Plan of Safe Care (ex: compliance with MAT, taking medications as prescribed, no

> Substance Exposed Infant: A child under the age of 12 months who has been subjected to legal or illegal substance abuse while in utero.

> Important to Remember!!! Any infant who has been identified as being affected by or exposed prenatally to substances is required to have a plan of safe care in place. This includes prenatal exposure associated with a mother's Medication

Assisted Treatment for sub-1. Increased stress associated with stance use disorders. motherhood, infant care, sleep deprivation

- 2. Limited social support and resource availability
- 3. Increased financial demands

POSC Coordination should include the following:

- 1. Assess the health and substance use disorder needs of the infant, family and caregiver.
- 2. Obtain an Authorization for Release of Information (ROI) from the subject or parent/guardian of the infant/other children for whom the information is being requested, when it is necessary to obtain/share information and/or to initiate referrals.
- 3. Ensure that the Plan of Safe Care addresses:

a. The health and substance abuse treatment needs of the infant and caregiver; and

b. The needs of the other family members affected by the substance abuse.

- 4. Monitor the Plan of Safe Care to determine whether referrals are made and delivery of appropriate services to the affected infant, family or caregiver.
- Develop the Plan of Safe Care addressing the needs of the 5. infant, other children in the home, mother, and other family members.

6. Identify and obtain agreement regarding a responsible party for provision of services for the mother, other caregivers, infant and other in the home.

What to include in the Plan of Safe Care
